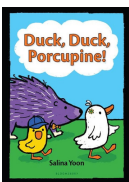


## The Totally Secret Secret

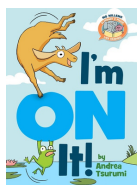


## The Cookie Fiasco

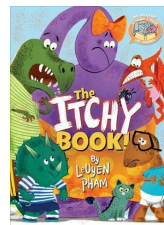


## I'm On It!

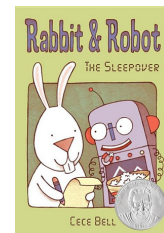


## A Good Team

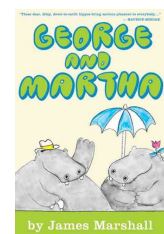


## Rabbit & Robot: The Sleepover

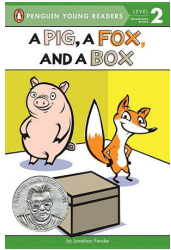
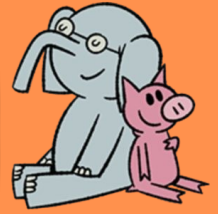

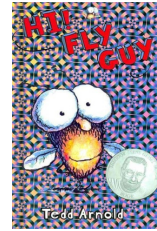


## A pig, a Fox, and a Box

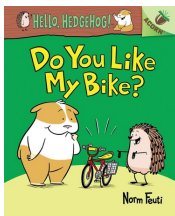


## Hi! Fly Guy

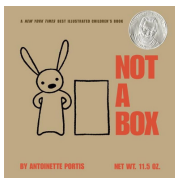
## Cranky Chicken

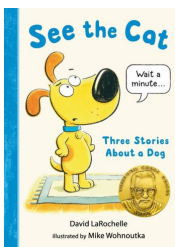

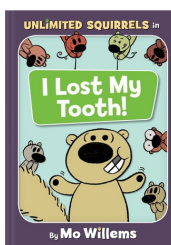
## The Good for Nothing Button
